

**"Isaiah 1-12 Review"**

1. This first section of Isaiah (chs. 1-12) ends with a chapter of worship to our great God. What name is used for Him in 12:6? How else has this name been used in the first section of Isaiah (1:4; 5:19, 24; 10:20)? What does this name mean to Christians today who are not part of Israel?
2. How does the Lord do the same things today for Christians that Israel thanks Him for in 12:1? What thoughts do 1:18 and 6:5-7 add to this? How do the things listed in v. 1 lead you to give thanks to the Lord, like Israel will do "on that day"?
3. How is the Lord God your "salvation"? (2) What benefits does this salvation lead to? (1-3) How does one of these benefits mean something special to you personally?
4. After we give thanks to the Lord for His salvation, what further response should we give once we realize how great His salvation is? (4-5) How do the Lord Jesus' commands in Matthew 5:16 and 28:18-20 help us better understand how we should respond today?
5. Song and shouting are mentioned three times in chapter 12 (2, 5, 6). In what ways do you find it helpful to praise the Lord by singing to Him aloud?
6. Review the following Messianic verses from Isaiah 1-12. What did each one prophesy to Israel about their coming Messiah? How was (or will be) each of these fulfilled in the Lord Jesus?

7. Review Isaiah 2:2-4 and 11:6-10, What do these verses say about the still-future kingdom of God that will be inaugurated when the Lord Jesus Christ returns to earth in His second coming?
8. There are quite a few verses about coming judgment in these first chapters of Isaiah. What awaits those who reject the Lord's gracious offer of salvation?  
1:7-9, 20, 28 2:12, 19 3:1, 11, 13, 25 5:25
9. After reading about these judgments, what hope do you find from reading about the promised remnant of Israel who will still believe and be saved? 4:3 10:20-22 11:11-16
10. What practical applications were given back then to God's people that still hold for us today?  
1:16-17 5:20-21 10:1-2
